Pick up a Naloxone kit

Naloxone Kits are used to reverse opioid overdoses and are available for free to individuals at pharmacies. Pharmacists can provide training and should not ask for ID to receive a kit. By keeping a naloxone kit on hand, you can save someone's life! When you share with others that you carry naloxone, you're participating in harm reduction, reducing stigma and demonstrating the belief that all humans deserve to be seen, heard and cared for by their community!

If you need help accessing a kit, feel free to ask us and we will support you to get one.

Buy a coffee for someone
